Duties and Responsibilities

The UCL Institute of Archaeology is seeking to appoint a full-time Teaching Fellow in Egyptian Archaeology on a 12 month contract, available from 1 September 2016. The Teaching Fellow will co-ordinate the BA in Egyptian Archaeology and work closely alongside the MA in the Archaeology of Egypt and the Near East coordinator, coordinating and teaching one MA Egyptian Archaeology course, giving lectures in core and option courses to undergraduate and postgraduate students, supervising dissertations, running student tutorials, marking assessments, participating in student recruitment activities and contributing more generally to the archaeology of Egypt and Nubia at UCL.

The post is available for 12 months in the first instance.

Key Requirements

Applicants will be expected to have a PhD in the archaeology of Egypt or Nubia, and research interest in comparative archaeology, along with good teaching experience at BA and MA level. Candidates will ideally have a proven track record of high-quality publications.
